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FLOTILLA COMMANDER'S MONTHLY LETTER



APRIL 2024

Trivia: On 20 Apr 2010, the oil drilling rig Deep Water Horizon had a catastrophic failure causing an explosion of the platform. After the explosion, the only thing holding the Deepwater Horizon in place was the riser and drill pipe connection between the floating platform and the wellhead some 5,000 feet below the ocean surface. The enormous size of the spill – estimated at about 60,000 barrels a day at its peak, flowing from the damaged well for 87 days, covering thousands of square miles of water and almost 4,400 miles of shoreline, including Louisiana's vast array of bays and inlets – made both *Deepwater Horizon* and the response unprecedented. On the single-most demanding day, more than 6,000 vessels, 102 aircraft, and nearly 48,000 personnel were working to contain the spill.

Spring is finally in the air, the birds are making nests (some where we don't want them), the plants are sprouting and blooming, and river water levels are coming up to something that is more navigable. The marina is planning the removal of earth dam in the next week or so. We have a little spring prep to do to the boats, and PPE inspections need to be completed.

Several flotilla members participated in the "Water Connects us All" event at the Council Bluffs Public Library. We had a lot of good information and a couple activities available that folks found interesting. The event was slightly hampered by an unknown athletic event blocking off much of the area around the library. Given those challenges, it was a pretty good turnout and thank Doug Ives for his efforts. Also participating were our CG Recruiting Team, consisting of Jim Wolfe. During our March meeting we handed out 20 Yr Membership to Barclay Stebbins, 15 Yr Membership to Doug Ives, and sent John Hawkinson his 15 Yr membership. Rochelle Nolte was also available by Zoom, and recognized for her BQ status.

Reminder, for those that need RM/TCT, dates are out so watch for those if you need it. Also, for those that need the VE and the IT refresher, the courses are out there for 2024. These need to completed by 30 Jun 2024

United States Coast Guard Auxiliary Next Practices in Achieving Diversity & Inclusion

The Auxiliary has already created its Policy Statement and Strategic Plan to develop diversity and inclusion initiatives throughout the organization. Our Plan addresses the purpose, vision, specific goals, and action items toward managing diversity.

Next, it's incumbent upon the Auxiliary's elected and appointed Leadership to incorporate and carry out our diversity policies and objectives into every aspect of the organization's functions and purpose. It is our Leaders who'll be expected to carry out an active role in implementing our diversity processes helping the Auxiliary maintain the competitive edge as a volunteer organization; our actions will be aligned with the core values of Honor, Respect, and Devotion to Duty.

Now is also the time to move beyond viewing diversity and inclusion as merely the numerical representation of certain groups. It's time for a systematic application of diversity concepts to the business of our organization. Diversity and inclusion are business priorities of Team Coast Guard and it takes people with diverse talents and perspectives in an inclusive culture.

What is Diversity & Inclusion?

"Diversity includes all characteristics and experiences that define each of us as individuals." A common misconception about diversity is that only certain persons or groups are included under its umbrella, when in fact, exactly the opposite is true. Diversity includes the entire spectrum of primary dimensions of an individual, including race, ethnicity, gender, age, religion, disability, and sexual orientation. Secondary dimensions commonly include: communication style, work style, organizational role/level, economic status, and geographic origin. It is a simple fact that each of us possesses unique qualities along each of these dimensions.

Leadership Commitment

The degree to which our leaders are actively involved in implementing initiatives, taking ownership and communicating the vision will be a test of their leadership. Managers manage change, but best-in-class leaders create change by inspiring their members, they also recognize the importance of diversity and inclusion being infused into all of the Auxiliary's processes. Diversity and inclusion is both a top priority and a personal responsibility for our leaders

Empowering through Leadership

As a part of our next practices, diversity and inclusion will not depend on a single leader because it will be woven into the fabric of the way we will conduct business. Specific measures included in the plan are: positive responses to member surveys, positive articles in publications, sustaining the reputation as a volunteer organization of choice, improved representation of diversity at all levels, effective remedial action when appropriate, awards, and other recognition.

Coast Guard Medal AWARDED FOR ACTIONS DURING Peace Time Awards

Service: <u>Coast Guard</u>

CITATION:

The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Coast Guard Medal to Seaman Apprentice Benjamin F. Wingo, United States Coast Guard, for extraordinary heroism on 12 February 1997 while serving as a crew member aboard Coast Guard Motor Lifeboat 44363, attached to Coast Guard Station Quillayute River. Shortly before 1 o'clock in the morning, responding to a distress call from the sailing vessel GALE RUN-NER, Station Quillayute River launched two rescue boats. The operator of GALE RUN-NER reported that the vessel was dismasted, taking on water, and in danger of sinking, 2 miles south of the Quillayute River entrance. Seas of up to 25 feet, combined with high winds and driving rain, created a situation of imminent danger for the two people aboard the GALE RUNNER. Soon after crossing the treacherous bar in an attempt to reach the stricken sailboat, the motor lifeboat suddenly rolled over several times in the surf and confused seas. As a result of the repeated roll-overs, three crew members were forcibly separated from his rescue craft and thrown into the churning ocean. Seaman Apprentice Wingo managed to remain on his rescue craft and released his safety line as his stricken lifeboat itself crashed repeatedly on the rocks. Despite his harrowing ordeal, he was able to fire flares to signal his boat's and his crewmates' distress. A Coast Guard HH-65 helicopter from Air Station Port Angeles was able to hoist to safety the two people from the GALE RUNNER as it crashed on the rocks. As a crewmember of Coast Guard 44363, Seaman Apprentice Wingo willingly entered extreme ocean storm conditions and risked his own life while attempting to save the lives of the two people from the GALE RUNNER. Seaman Apprentice Wingo demonstrated remarkable initiative, exceptional fortitude, and daring in spite of imminent personal danger in this rescue. His courage and devotion to duty are most heartily commended and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Coast Guard.
